## **TOWN MANAGER UPDATES**

#### **Major Construction Period in Bristol Underway**

A two-year phase of significant construction is now in progress in Bristol.

 Work on the new water tower, the installation of new water mains, and construction of the new wastewater treatment plant are making good progress and are about 25% complete.

The projects expected to have the most substantial impact on traffic in Bristol this year include the relocation of:

- Gas lines
- Electric lines
- Frontier and Comcast communication lines



These relocations are paving the way for INDOT's replacement of SR 120 and SR 15 through our downtown areas. The INDOT project is set to begin in Spring 2026 and will continue until Spring 2027.

#### **Project Updates**

- **NIPSCO Substation Construction:** The construction of the NIPSCO substation and the accompanying large steel pole infrastructure is set to be completed by late this fall. Currently, the remaining poles to be installed are located along Ponderosa, Mottville Road, and CR 4.
- Street Reconstruction Plans: The Town is preparing to reconstruct both St. Joe Street and Elkhart Street between Division and Ponderosa. This project will also include the installation of new water mains and is scheduled for late summer.
- Business Route Update: The Town Council has approved the acquisition of right-of-way to connect Earthway Blvd. to Bloomingdale Drive. This connection aims to provide a faster route for commercial vehicles and is expected to meet the criteria used by INDOT to justify a traffic light at Division Street.
- **Development Proposals:** The vacant lots on Main Street next to the bridge are set to be addressed, as the Town Council plans to issue a request for proposals (RFP) for new development in that area. The RFP is anticipated to be finalized by late summer.
- Water and Sewer Rate Increase: The Council postponed the increase originally scheduled for May 1st until August 1, 2025. This extension allows for further evaluation of current rates to better assess the necessity for another increase. The Council plans to review this data during their Council meeting on July 3 at 7 PM.

Bristol is undergoing significant infrastructure changes, representing an estimated investment of over \$40 million. For the next two years, living, working, or driving through Bristol will be inconvenient. However, once these projects are completed, the town will benefit from modernized water and wastewater facilities, a revitalized main street, newly paved residential streets, and upgraded electrical infrastructure to support new homes and businesses. As the projects wrap up, residents will have the chance to tour the new water tower site and the wastewater treatment plant. For the next 24 months, patience will not be an overrated virtue.

If you are new to the area, we would like to say "Welcome!" A quick note about utility (water/sewer) bills. The payments are due on the 15<sup>th</sup> of each month. We offer multiple payment methods that include: pay by text, online, auto-deduct, call the office to pay by phone and good old-fashioned check or cash in the payment drop box located inside the Municipal Complex doors off of the parking lot. Please reach out to our office if interested in changing your method of payment to one of the above-mentioned options.

We are in the process of replacing our older water meters, and with that is an option to log in to an app called Waterscope to view your water activity. This tool is helpful in allowing residents to see where their usage is highest and possibly in finding a leak situation faster than receiving a bill in the mail with an above average usage amount. If you have not yet registered for the waterscope app or have an interest in seeing if your meter has been changed, and this is an option for you, please stop by the office Monday – Friday 8:00a-4:00p or call us at (574) 848-7007 ext. 3 or 5.

## FIRE CHIEF NIK KANTZ



Everyone here at the Bristol Fire Department is looking forward to another great summer! Bonneyville Mill is always a big draw, as is our hometown festivals and the Homecoming fireworks. As with all outdoor summer activities, we would like to take a moment to remind everyone about staying safe in the sun, heat, and humidity of summer.

The signs and symptoms of dehydration are often not readily noticed by a majority of the population, but there are some telltale signs that would clue you in on the fact that you may not be drinking enough water. One of the first signs to indicate possible dehydration is a dry mouth with thirst and a lack of urination. Prevention of this is to drink plenty of water throughout the day, even if you're not thirsty. The guzzling of water when thirsty is actually highly detrimental and is not recommended. Coffee, soda pop, and energy drinks usually contain caffeine, which is a diuretic (and makes you urinate), and, therefore, does not qualify as water. There are few things on this earth that are capable of replacing the water in our bodies than water itself.

Another summertime item to keep on hand is sunscreen. As you may have noticed, every brand of sunscreen on the shelf has what's called "SPF" written somewhere on the label. This stands for "Sun Protection Factor," and this essentially informs the buyer of how much sun protection they will receive from a particular sunscreen product. The higher the SPF, the greater the sun protection. People who have fair skin, the young and the elderly, or those who are naturally susceptible to getting sunburns, would reap the most benefits from wearing sunscreen. The Skin Cancer Foundation does recommend that you reapply your sunscreen every two hours, particularly after swimming, sweating heavily, or drying yourself with a towel.

On another unrelated note, the Bristol Fire Department will again be participating in the United Way "Great Cardboard Boat Race," which will be held at the LaSalle Bristol pond, located on County Road 17, on Friday, August 15<sup>th</sup>, 2025. Due to our competitive nature and cardboard boat building skills, we have won the First Responder's Heat two years in a row now and are looking to make this year a three-peat! If you're able, we would really enjoy seeing some of our local residents show up for a good time and a good cause, while helping to cheer on your local fire department.
